Tick/Mosquito Season

The weather is warming up and has been a very wet season so far. Know what that means? It's tick and mosquito season! If not, it's coming whether we like it or not.

These pests are known to carry pathogens that cause diseases in humans. There are over 900 tick species around the world but only 25 are considered nasty to humans. There are 3600 species of mosquitos around the world. Female Anopheles mosquitos are what we get bitten by mostly here in Utah. These mosquitoes are carriers/vectors of diseases. By transmitting diseases, as many as 725,000 people die each year.

How do we protect ourselves from these pests? There are many options to help avoid these pests. Citronella incense keeps mosquitos away, walking in center of trail to avoid brushes and tall grass where ticks live, don't eat bananas helps avoid mosquitoes, apply EPA approved mosquito repellents on clothing, wear long sleeve and light colored clothing helps keep ticks away, avoid wooded and brushy areas with high grass and leaf litter.

These are just a few of many ways to avoid these pests during outdoor activities. Be safe and protect yourselves from these pests.

Deaf Utahns

Did you know that Utah Workforce Services Rehabilitation reported that there are 600,000 people here in Utah that have some sort of hearing loss? Wow, that's a lot of people, huh? That's almost one in every five that experience hearing loss. 10% of these same people use ASL as their primary language.

All the more reason to have different organizations providing access to a variety of things. Most of these organizations that help the members of the deaf communities get funding through donations, private grants, foundations, or government grants. Utah Deaf Campers, Inc. is one of these organizations.
